Ohio's state bird, the male of this pair is bright red and the female is a more subtle tan to brownish pink. Mates for life, they stay year long in Ohio, when other birds migrate south.

pansi V.

These are colorful, Ohio garden flowers with heart shaped, overlapping petals that seem to have a face. Pansies symbolize "thinking" or "thoughts." The word "pansy" itself comes from French pensée, meaning "thought." If grown organically, they are edible flowers!

> Also known as the American Moon Moth, it is in a group of "giant silk moths." It's a lovely lime green, and has "eyespots," one per wing. These are oval in shape on the forewings and round on the hindwings. The eyespots are thought to confuse predators. These are bigger than typical moths and seen in Ohio.

A perching Ohio bird that lives in North and Central America, and the male is all black with a red shoulder and yellow wing bar. They have a very distinct song and if you live in Ohio you have most certainly



heard it.

5 shamrocks

A 3 petaled green sprig, this little plant's name comes from an Irish word meaning "young clover." It is the symbol of the city of Dublin, Ohio, and also of Irish things everywhere!

1 bown Sparrow

This little brown bird is the national bird of Italy, and is

hard to distinguish between

the common brown house

sparrow in Ohio. They eat

seeds and like to live

in urban areas.

sunflowers


Found in Ohio and Italy both! This flower's seeds (and oil) are a source of food for birds and people. Sunflowers are heliotropic, which means that they turn their flowers to follow the movement of the Sun throughout the day. In Italian, they are called Girasoli!



anemones

These flowers are in the buttercup family, but often called wildflowers, and can be many shapes and colors. They are known in Greek mythology as a "wind flower" or "daughter of the wind." These flowers now grow in many places in the world, including Ohio.

This native North American wildflower is golden yellow in color and grows in meadows in Ohio. These are a valuable food source for pollinators, particularly the Monarch butterfly. Goldenrod is also known for its healing properties.



A loud, well known Ohio insect, these live in and on trees, and have an exceptionally loud song. The 17-year cicada is called Magicicada, where they come up in large numbers every 17 years. Some people only see them when they leave their exoskeleton behind!

4 coneflowers

Pink Echinacea, a member of the Daisy family, grows only in Eastern & Central North America. You will see a lot in Ohio! There are 10 different species of coneflowers. 1 Bee-Eater

1 spotfed salamander

The state amphibian of Ohio! These are mole salamanders and you may have no idea they are under your feet in the ground! Females are larger than males and have

brighter spots!

Colorful perching bird that actually eats bees and wasps by knocking off the stinger first! You can find these in Italy & other countries around the Mediterranean & Africa. They are social and gregarious in personality!
